Reading and Writing and Performing

We will be learning about William Shakespeare and his influence on literature. Our main focus will be on his tragedy 'Macbeth' and 'The Tempest' as well as familiarisation with other notable works by the playwright.

- To compare Macbeth to other works by Shakespeare.
- To perform specific, famous scenes from Macbeth.
- To read, analyse and write own version of the famous 'Witches' Spell' from Macbeth.
- To work with my peers to develop a performance.
- To understand Shakespearean language and how this could be interpreted today.
- To understand how this play would be performed in Shakespeare's time.
- Identify similarities and differences between texts, or different versions of Shakespeare's works, with some explanation.
- To understand the features of Shakespeare's comedies, tragedies and histories.

History

Learning:

- We will be learning about a significant figure in British History after 1066 (William Shakespeare).
- We will revise our knowledge of life in the Tudor and Stuart eras and the changing power of significant monarchs.
- We will learn about the history of the theatre (Shakespearean and through time to modern day).

We will be reading 'The Final Year' by Matt Goodfellow

Outcomes

- To perform a poem with impact
- To write about myself in verse
- To respond to a book in a personal way
- To examine a character's feelings

Learning

We will be learning more about the different celebrations celebrated in the Francophone world and learning more about two different religious celebrations celebrated. We will improve our cultural awareness of Paris in France and Port-au-Prince in Haiti and we will learn how to be more responsible global citizens by doing more to protect the planet.

Outcomes

To be aware of the many countries in the Francophone world. To know about different festivals (religious and non-religious) around the world. To know that we are different and yet all the same. To know that we can all help to protect our planet. To know how to use "à" (when talking about living in a city) and "en/au/aux" (when talking about living in a country).

Learning

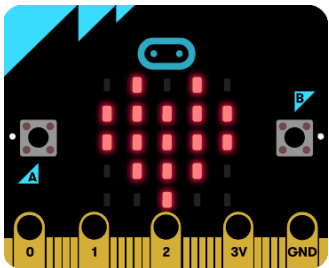
Programming – sensing movement
To create a program to run on a controllable device:
To explain that selection can control the flow of a program.
To update a variable with a user input
To use a conditional statement to compare a variable to a value
To design a project that uses inputs and outputs on a controllable device

Outcome

To develop a program to use inputs and outputs on a controllable device.
To evaluate their own and a partner's different design.

Learning:

- To learn about the physical and emotional changes during puberty and to understand the different changes between boys and girls.
- To identify the physical, emotional and behavioural changes.
- To understand how we can look after our bodies during puberty e.g. hygiene.

Outcome:

To listen and respond respectfully, to feel confident to raise their own concerns and to recognise and care about other people's feelings.

Learning

Animals including humans.

- Identify and name the main parts of the circulatory system.
- Learn the function of blood and explain how the circulatory system works.
- Investigate the impact exercise has on the heart.
- Explore the influence of a healthy lifestyle on the heart.
- Explore the negative impacts of drugs on the heart.

Experimental skills and investigations

- ask questions and develop a line of enquiry based on observations of the real world, alongside prior knowledge and experience.
- make predictions using scientific knowledge and understanding.
- select, plan and carry out the most appropriate types of scientific enquiries to test predictions, including identifying independent, dependent and control variables.
- use appropriate techniques, apparatus, and materials during fieldwork and laboratory work, paying attention to health and safety.
- make and record observations and measurements using a range of methods for different investigations; and evaluate the reliability of methods and suggest possible improvements.

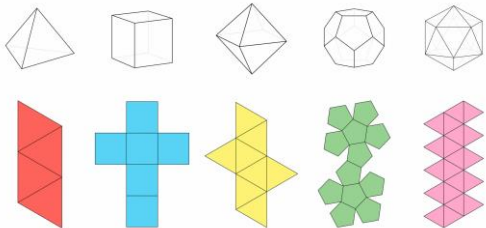
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Maths

Learning

- Consolidate prior learning based on their emerging needs derived from the curriculum coverage this academic year.
- Draw 2-D shapes using given dimensions and angles.
- Recognise, describe and build simple 3-D shapes, including making nets.
- Compare and classify geometric shapes based on their properties and sizes and find unknown angles in any triangles, quadrilaterals, and regular polygons.

We will also be carrying out a number of maths investigations using and applying our knowledge and skills within a range of areas including time, money, properties of numbers and data handling. We will be focussing on working systematically and presenting solutions in a clear and organised way.



P.E – OAA Team Building

Learning

- To use clear communication, strength and flexibility to complete a variety of team tasks.
- To explore maps with others.
- To start to draw and edit maps to show key landmarks and features.
- To complete a variety of team tasks without various senses.
- To safely take part in trust based activities.
- To start explore the school grounds to identify key features and markings.

Outcome

Pupils will be able take part in a variety of team-based games, with certain rules and senses applied/removed. They will also be able to read a variety of detailed maps and understand key features on a map.

Games: Rounder's

Learning:

- To be able to pitch the ball at the appropriate height and weight.
- To be aware of the 'backwards rule' and play an active role as 'backstop'.
- To be able to talk and communicate effectively as a team in both an attacking and fielding sense.
- To be conscious and aware of when and when not to run.
- To be able to umpire and score without any bias.
- To be able to field and catch in open space and move in the direction of the batter.
- To be aware and understand the scoring system in traditional rounder's.

Outcome:

Pupils will know how to pitch a ball correctly with weight and power in mind. They will be able to know when and when not to run and what this means to their team sores. Also, will know where to stand when observing the batters hitting projectory.
